Framed between the valleys of the emblematic rivers Júcar and Cabriel, the perfect characteristics for the vineyard come together in this land. History suggests viticultural evidence in the area for more than 2,400 years, having passed on the know-how from generation to generation until today. All this has given rise to a precious wine culture. A particular climate gives the grape an extraordinary evolution. Sun, lack of humidity and a singular continental and Mediterranean fusion, with the east wind, favour the ecological character of the wine. All the charm and know-how of centuries-old tradition is combined perfectly with advanced techniques of development which after rigorous quality control, offers unique wine. As for the varieties, the Bobal stands out as the emblematic native grape.

Wine quality is a special topic that many people are passionate about, experts in oenology or not. La Manchuela Wine Route has stood out in recent years for the quality of its wine. Today you can enjoy a Denomination of Origin wine that endorses the quality and care that is put into the vitivinicultural crops found along this route.

Today La Manchuela Wine Route stands as an excellent option to get to know the rich flavours and aromas of the wine of this land that remains anchored in a privileged point of the Iberian Peninsula. Seeing the surroundings will help you to understand the authenticity of the wine. Spain is the cradle of high quality wines and the winemakers of this noble region continue to raise industry standards with their daily work.

La Manchuela Wine Route boasts **Denomination of Origin that has become one of its most distinctive features**. The Manchuela Denomination of Origin is a collegiate body of participation between the groups of producers and the sectorial organisations of the wine sector in the region of La Manchuela. Its mission is to guarantee the quality and image of its unique wine, valuing five strategic variables: history, land, climate, tradition combined with technology and native varieties. These elements generate specific conditions in the area which in turn have an enormous influence on an excellent final result: a high quality wine.

In order to maintain the high quality standards established throughout Spain, La Manchuela Wine Route works with the intention of offering very diverse wines of great value. The character of its producers means that work culture goes beyond standards and focuses on a respect for the values of nature and cultivation as a starting point.

La Manchuela Wine Route **shows a diverse and extraordinary variety of wine** made with the most advanced techniques, but at the same time accompanied by a century-old wine tradition in the different regions, in domestic caves or jaraíz. From these production processes a young red wine with a strong colour is achieved, with an intense fruity aroma and persistent tannins, made mostly with bobal.

The white wine produced in La Manchuela Wine Route stands out for its yellowish and pale tone, although it is bright with some green tones. Aromatic and fruity, upon tasting it you can percieve a bit of acidity. Also the rosé wine stands out for its good visual aspect and the elegance of its



flavour and aroma. Its color and tone qualify the youth that is evident to the eyes of experts in winemaking.

Each one of the types of wine cultivated in La Manchuela Wine Route, presents a variation, according to the way it is produced or preserved, but all have the Denomination of Origin. Similar wines with specific characteristics can be elaborated in many other regions, but they will never have the same flavours and aromas, **thanks to the special lands or terroirs that make up the Manchuela** region and that serve to cultivate the raw material. In summary, a singular wine, which leaves nobody indifferent, with a surprising history, born in a privileged land, pampered by its own climate, guided by tradition and technology, which highlights the value of indigenity.







Abengibre

ALBACETE



The perfect combination of history, nature and culture

On a small hillside at just over 630 metres of altitude, you can admire the small locality of Abengibre, a town bathed in a picture sque stream, known to local residents as La Cañada. It was founded by Arabs, which is where the gentilic name Ibn-Yabr comes in, meaning 'son of the radiant one'. In the 19th century the town was separated from Jorquera, making it a separate municipality.

Apart from being placed in a privileged area of natural beauty, this town has a rich patrimonial history. In 1996 the doors of its Abengibre Museum opened, whose permanent collection of archaeological artefacts belong to different periods of history and their respective occupation. One of the main archaeological findings is the Vajilla Ibérica – The Iberian Dishes – which is also known as the 'Treasure of Abengibre' given its importance compared to other findings in the area and with regards to Iberian culture. The original pieces are in the National Archaeological Museum in Madrid, in Abengibre you will find eight exact replicas of the plates, all of different sizes.

If we are talking about festivities, you have a choice between Lardy Thursday (the Thursday before lent), San Isidro, San Miguel "The Small," Cultural Week (second week of August) and the Shows of San Miguel in September, where the battles between Moors and Christians are brought to the stage. The latter is the most representative festivity of Abengibre.

Natural beauty

Alatoz is a municipality in Albacete which belongs to the region of La Manchuela. The basis for its economy is agriculture, mainly the cultivation of cereals, almonds, olives and saffron which is one of the main sources of wealth for the town, and its flower can be seen in the town's coat of arms.

Situated in the gorge of the Júcar, Alatoz offers surroundings full of natural beauty. So much so that La Ruta de La Lana (the wool route) of the Camino de Santiago passes through the town, crossing the Vallejo del Hontanares and the Camino de Alpera walking routes. What's more, when the almond trees are blossoming the whole town is painted in colour, unveiling all its splendour.

A good way to enjoy Alatozan culture is to visit the Patron Saint festivities of San Juan Bautista and the Virgen del Rosario (Rosary Virgin) which are celebrated on the 24th June and the first Sunday of October respectively. All this, added to the area's wealth of gastronomy will mean you can enjoy a unique getaway.



Alcalá del Júcar



Genuine beauty between mountains

Alcalá del Júcar is one of the most spectacular, pictureque towns in the Albacete province; its location and exceptional landscape forms part of the Júcar gorge and makes you feel the need to stop completely to contemplate its immense beauty when you have it in front of your eyes.

The houses of popular architecture excavated in the mountain adapt to the terrain in the narrow and steep streets, climbing towards the castle that looks out at the gorge and the river that forms at its feet. Its rooms are currently dedicated to exhibitions.

This destination full of history, culture, nature and gastronomy in a privileged environment invites you to discover it.



Balsa de Ves is a small municipality with a quiet and welcoming character, whose landscape is dominated by dry stone constructions called chozos or thatched huts, similar to those of Alborea and which also served as a refuge for farmers. Taking a walk through its landscapes we will find the Páramo de Ves chozo, a refuge for the farmers, built stone by stone that will not leave the visitor

Walk through its streets contemplating its 18th century barroque church and experience firsthand the patron saint festivities in honor of San Antón and Santa Cruz.

Enjoy a pleasant hiking route through the fountains that supplied water to Balsa de Ves, among them you will find the Fuente Larga, the Fuentecilla, the Fuente de la Morchonar, the Fuente del Curavie or the Fuente del Tollo, all connected by a network of walking routes.

The hometown of the most famous La Manchuela personality

Municipality of Roman origin famous for being footballer Andrés Iniesta's hometown. However, Fuentealbilla is much more than that: its people, its cuisine and its history should not be cast aside.

The war between Carthage and Rome brought the Romans to the peninsula during the Second Punic War where they build bridges, aqueducts and causeways. Fuentealbilla was also in the crosshairs of the Romans, who left an emblematic building, the Fuente Grande, a Roman cistern that today is still in good condition. However, one of the most surprising Roman discoveries was a stone-carved figure of a human head from Roman times, which was found by a farmer.

Its Parish church of Santiago, of baroque style, and its salinas of possibly Roman origin are two features of great importance in Fuentealbilla. Discover its rich and varied cuisine and sample escarcileras, collejas, minchos, pumpkins and the famous Manchegan gazpacho.

La Recueja ALBACETE





a place full of tradition

Following the road through the mountain, La Recueja appears nestled in the Júcar river valley and you can appreciate the beauty of the landscape whilst either fishing, hiking or simply admiring the impressive stone walls that have formed from the erosion of the river since the very beginning of the formation of the valley.

After a great walk along the river Júcar and the Constitution square where the Town Hall and its Parish Church are located, it is essential to taste its official drink ambi, whose name is not a coincidence. The creator was named Ambivio, a neighbour of the people who invented it during the economic crisis so that people with few financial resources could also go into the bars and enjoy a drink.

Its most representative tradition and one that can still be seen today, is the Hachos, a bunch of esparto (a type of straw) that is set alight and had the simple function of providing light. Today esparto is burned on the day of San Blas and San Antón.

Mahora, a municipality surrounded by the Júcar and Valdemembra rivers, has a name of Arab origin, which is believed to come from the word tavern.


The romanization of this territory from the 1st century BC is manifested by the existence of archaeological sites in Casa de la Matosa, Villares de Tochoso or the remains of San Roque Street. Upon exploring its streets you will also find the gothic style Church of Our Lady of the Assumption, which has been declared a site of cultural interest, highlighting the Baroque chapel dedicated to the Holy Rosary. The semi-ruins of Convent of Our Lady of Grace is one of the most emblematic and important buildings for the inhabitants, who work specifically to restore and protect the local historical-artistic heritage.

Its array of bars, restaurants, guesthouses, rural accommodation, cultural services and sports facilities make Mahora an ideal destination to unwind and enjoy a few days of relaxation.



Between nature and Roman history

The history of Valdeganga dates back to the 2nd century BC, specifically to the time of the Romans, who founded this municipality in the province of Albacete.

This is a nature destination par excellence, it is located in a privileged natural enclave with great landscape contrasts, where you can do many activities such as hiking, fishing or take a bike ride to Albacete by the bike path that connects both locations.

Valdeganga is not a municipality that lacks cultural resources and is that, given its history, in this town you will find numerous remains of the ancient Roman Empire as two Roman roads that crossed the city, one in the direction of Zaragoza and another in the direction of Valencia. In addition, you can also visit the ruins of "El Santo", where formerly there was a hermitage dedicated to San Benito, as well as some Roman settlements.

Natural paradise

Very close to the gorges of the river Cabriel you will find a very unique town: Villa de Ves. In its surroundings there are several landmarks that will leave you fascinated if you are a lover of outdoor tourism. The first, the Sanctuary of Cristo de la Vida, a small Gothic style church that stands on top of an impressive stone wall and falls into the river Júcar, dating back to the 16th century. Its interior is worth visiting, as it conserves an intact musical organ from the era. The surroundings have abundant fauna and flora, which really sets the scene as you hike, bike or fish, and why not take advantage of the river waters to cool off on warm days or simply enjoy the natural scenery.

Another tourist attraction is the Molinar Reservoir, the largest in La Manchuela and one of the most unexpected, yet it is accessible to all those who want to visit its forests, canyons and gorges.

Thanks to its water resources, the surroundings of this municipality stood out at the beginning of the 20th century. In 1910 a hydroelectric power plant was built, which was a fundamental pillar in the second industrial revolution in Spain, thanks to the fact that the river tension rose considerably, giving service to Madrid and Levante. A town was built deliberately for the workers of the hydroelectric power plant, with a school, police station, church, etc., however it was abandoned when the power plant closed.

Villamalea





a valley full of tradition

Villamalea is a municipality located north of the province of Albacete. It has a wide variety of attractions that you can enjoy whether you are more athletic or simply want to take in the natural beauty of the area. The river Cabriel runs through the town, which, together with its valley, make up the two most important natural resources. The town is connected by a path to the small village of Tamayo, where its centennial banana tree stands out, as do the Fuente del Piojo and the Cueva de los Ángeles.

If you are a culture lover, in Villamalea you can find a wealth of attarctions from religious architecture to civil and military architecture. Of these, the Hermitage of the Conception and the Church of the Annunciation stand out, both monuments declared sites of cultural interest. In terms of civil architecture, we can find several flour mills that are located on the banks of the river, as well as the old school of cigar makers, which was in working order until the sixties. Only the structure has been conserved.

Villatoya ALBACETE





Villatoya is in a privileged location, in the valley of the Cabriel River. Nature lovers will surely appreciate the slopes of the river, the sources and the various fountains, all in an exceptional spot where you can enjoy a refreshing swim in the summer in natural spas such as the Baños de la Concepcion, fishing or practising water sports in the same river.

Historically, this valley has been inhabited since the Neolithic age. Iberians, Arabs and Romans have passed through it, but the latter are the ones who have used the sources' medicinal properties outside of Villatoya, the same ones that are still in use to this day . Very close to this village is the village of Cilanco, where the old laundries are preserved, the old irrigation system and the part of a Roman road, which are worth visiting.

This small town will not be leave you indifferent, because it has an astronomical observatory for astrotourism lovers, where you can observe the stars on a clear night.

Wine tourism in its finest form

El Herrumblar is a municipality whose economic base is the wine production. It has received numerous awards for the quality of its Antares wine, produced in these lands. In addition, olive and almond crops contribute to the economy of the area.

The municipality has great character and cultural identity, represented in several popular festivals that happen throughout the year. For example, in January, the day of the patron saint of the municipality, San Julián, is celebrated. Undoubtedly, the most anticipated parties are those that take place in the summer months, where the 'queens' and their courts are chosen, bullfights are also organised as are other events. To close the calendar of festivities, at the end of September you can enjoy those that honour Our Lady of the Star. These are perhaps the most authentic, as there is a great procession with the Virgin accompanied by a band, and where there is also a special place for the Cooperativa Nuestra Señora de la Estrella, which organises another procession including images of its patron saint and tasting of its wines.

If you are a culture lover, you simply have to visit monuments such as the parish church with the Hermitage of Our Lady of the Star, built in 1777. It can be found next to the cemetery of the town, the hermitage of San Julián, dating from 1680.

Natural attraction

Located in the Serrania de Cuenca and bathed by the river Cabriel, Enguídanos is history, nature, heritage and tradition. In this welcoming town, every era has left its legacy. Enguídanos was in the crosshairs of the Romans and Celtiberians which you can still see today in the archaeological remains of Cabeza Moya, La Vega, La Escarehuela, La Hoz del Agua, Panjarinos, El Pozuelo, El Retamal, Fuente de la Higuera y de la Plata and the Charco de las Palomas.

Venture into its urban center and be surprised by the charm of the Plaza Rafael Torrella where you can find beautiful photo-worthy balconies, wooden doors and windows. Visit the 15th and 16th century gothic and Mudejar style parish church of the Assumption and its Town Hall. Enguídanos retains tradition, conserving a 20th-century laundry room which is still in use today by the inhabitants of the town. In the distance, its emblematic castle stands at 734 meters of altitude and was built to keep a lookout over the Levantine kingdoms, built by the Arabs between the 10th and 11th centuries.

Nature lovers can enjoy the location of the Chorreras, an icon of Enguídanos with highly unique rock formations and characterised by great beauty and transparent waters where you can take a refreshing dip. Nature in its purest form! Enguídanos awaits you with open arms whether you come alone, with your family, friends or your partner to spend a few days of tranquility and peace. Nobody ever visits Enguídanos just once!




















Graja de Iniesta



The Graja iljustration

A small Cuenca municipality of 365 inhabitants whose name even has its history. The name of Graja is due to the presence of this class of birds and Iniesta was used in order to differentiate the town from other locations of the same name in close proximity.

The Tower of Optic Telegraphy of Graja de Iniesta is an invention that goes back to the century of the Illustration, the tower is the twentieth one of the section between Madrid and Valencia and was constructed in 1849. Its reach neared the city of Barcelona, making it one of the most important cultural resouces of this locality.

Be surprised by its patrimonial legacy reflected in the Parroquial Church of San Jorge, the Park of San Cristóbal, the Town Hall and its Plaza Mayor, which undoubtedly form a small but very special architectural ensemble.

Historical town

Iniesta is a town located on top of a hill. One of its main patrimonial jewels is Plaza Mayor which is framed by monuments such as the castle tower (11th century) and the Town Hall of the Villa (15th-16th centuries) that houses Renaissance mural grisailles. Next to the Plaza Mayor is the bullring (19th century) excavated at the top of the hill and a viewpoint with panoramic views of the manchuelo fields of the west. There are many houses emblazoned with heraldic shields of other eras and lords, with stone lintels, pilasters, noble arms, plateresque decorations ... that give the streets of Iniesta a vintage flavor, essence of its long and exciting history.

Its parish church is Renaissance, of remarkable size, with a Latin cross plan, two parallel doors and an imposing and grandiose bell tower. Near to Iniesta is the Consolation Site, with buildings of traditional architecture, a pilgrim guesthouse from 1710 and the magnificent sanctuary of the Virgin of Consolation, inaugurated in 1765. Celebration and pilgrimage is celebrated on Pentecost Sunday, declared of Regional Tourist Interest of Castilla-La Mancha. Last but not least, the Archaeological Museum of Iniesta shows local vestiges of the Bronze Age, Iberian Culture and Romanization, highlighting an Iberian mosaic from the 5th century BC, unique in Spain.



Footprints from the Renaissance

Marvel at the richness of a beautiful and extensive heritage, accumulated over the centuries, the epitome of treasure. Declared a National Monument, you will be amazed at the impressive Basilica of Our Lady of the Assumption which is a beautiful example of a mixture of Gothic, Renaissance and Baroque architecture, full of magnificent works of art and hidden mysteries. The Plaza Mayor, with its Renaissance buildings of the Town Hall and Posada Massó, both declared of Cultural Interest; the old Pósito and royal prison, with its clock tower; and last but not least, Villa Enriqueta, a 3-storey palace, which combines neo-Mudejar style and modernism.

Immerse yourself in a stroll through squares and streets where you will find several manor houses of the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, with coats of arms and shields, stone doorways, balconies and bars, until you reach the Convent of Santa Ana, XIII Foundation of Santa Teresa de Jesús . The Barefoot Carmelites also arrived after Teresa's footprint, and proof of this is in the great Church of Carmen, which reflects a style of "Carmelite architecture".

Villanueva de la Jara, pioneer in the cultivation of mushrooms and other funghi, which along with other popular dishes, you can taste and pair perfectly with excellent local wines. The sunsets are a spectacle of fire and light in the La Mancha plain and encourage you to stop and take in the beauty of the village, an excellent final destination on a trip defined by the small pleasures in life.


